How to record narration over a PowerPoint presentation

This guide explains how to record narration over a PowerPoint presentation. You can also do via Collaborate Ultra (this is explained in a separate guide).

Using audio-visual materials, such as narration over PowerPoint, can enhance students' engagement and reinforce learning. Audio enables you to provide nuance and emphasis on the materials through the modulation of your voice, this enhances the visual materials and supports student understanding of new concepts and knowledge.

How to record audio in PowerPoint

The easiest way to record audio in PowerPoint is to record a slideshow with narration. You can save this recording to be played as a PowerPoint presentation or as a video file.


Step 1: Open (or create) the presentation slides that you wish to use.

Step 2: Go to the tab **'Slide show'** within your PowerPoint presentation and select **'Record Slideshow'**.

Step 3: A menu will be displayed so you can select from which slide you want to start recording.



Warning: The **'Clear'** command deletes narrations or timings so only use it when you want to delete previous recordings.

Step 4: When the 'Record Slide Show' box appears select what you want to record. If this is your first-time recording, keep the default options.

Warning: Before recording, make sure that your microphone/headset is connected, and the **'Narration'** option is ticked, otherwise your voice will not be recorded.




Figure 3. Record Slide Show box

Step 5: Use the 'Recording' toolbar to record, pause, re-record or go the next slide.

When you finish recording your narration, a sound icon appears in the lower-right corner of each slide that has narration.

Step 6: To end your recording, right-click the final slide of your presentation and click **'End Show'**.




Figure 5. End show

If this is the first time that you are recording audio as a narration in PowerPoint, leave the default timing settings.

Another way to record audio in PowerPoint

As some users may find it a challenge to record voice over while delivering a slide presentation, there is an alternative way of recording audio for which you do not have to worry about timings or moving to the next slide when you are recording.

This is also a more suitable option if you want to use an external file as a narration or if you just want to record slide by slide.

Step 1: From the main menu of PowerPoint, select 'Insert' then 'Audio'

Step 2: To record audio for this slide, select the option 'Record Audio'.

- If you want to use an external audio file, select the option 'Audio on my PC' and upload the file to your presentation.
- From the different external audio files supported by PowerPoint, we recommend using the formats mp3 and m4a which are the most efficient formats in terms of quality and file size.

Listen to your recording

Both recording methods create an audio icon on the slide.

Click on the icon to listen to your recording.




Figure 7. Audio recording

Advanced recording settings

Saving your presentation as a video

Once you have recorded your narration, you can:

• Continue to save the presentation as a PowerPoint file which can then be shared with students.

Export the content as a video file by selecting the option 'File' > 'Export' > 'Create a video'.




Figure 8. Export

Usually the options 'Internet Quality' or 'Low quality' are best for streaming your video from online platforms such as Stream or Vision.

Your presentation will be exported as an mp4 file.

Warning: Some students may have limited bandwidth or access to the internet, only use video where it is essential for pedagogic purposes.

Sharing with students

Once you have saved your file as a PowerPoint presentation or as an mp4 video, then this can be shared with students by adding to Vision (See <u>SSLO Toolkit guide 01 Uploading materials to Vision</u> for guidance on how to do this).

If you want the recording to be automatically available on Vision, we recommend that you record in Collaborate Ultra (see the <u>SSLO Toolkit</u> for guidance on how to do this.)

Top Tips

- Before recording, make sure that the microphone/headset is connected and the 'Narration' option is ticked, otherwise your voice will not be recorded.
- For higher quality audio, use an external microphone or headset.
- If this is the first time that you are recording audio as a narration in PowerPoint, leave the default timing settings.
- PowerPoint does not record audio or video during transitions between slides, so don't speak while advancing the slide.
- Recordings are added to the presentation on a per-slide basis, so if you want to change a recording, you only need to re-record the affected slide or slides.
- You can rearrange the order of slides after recording without having to re-record anything.
- Exporting your presentation as video can take up considerable bandwidth so if you have a long PowerPoint presentation, consider breaking it sub-presentation or save slides and narration as a PowerPoint presentation.
- You cannot record narration in PowerPoint for the web. Use a desktop version of PowerPoint to record your narration.

Troubleshooting

- Most recording problems are caused by PowerPoint not recognising the microphone or headset so start by checking your audio settings.
- Visit the <u>Microsoft community</u> for advice on how to troubleshoot most of the common problems with PowerPoint.
